BURLINGTON SNAPSHOTS:

From our Villages collection - featuring this month - Kilbride by Patricia Taylor and Joan Downey

Kilbride is one of three villages on Cedar Springs Road. Both Dakota (also known as Willbrook) and Cumminsville are long gone but Kilbride remains.

Wm. Panton and Thomas Baker registered their plans for the village in 1853. It was a large lumbering area until 1860 and, to a lesser degree, until 1870. With all the trees gone, agriculture became the main industry. By 1877 the population was about 200. The village had a Presbyterian Church, an Anglican Church, and a school conjointly with Cumminsville.

This house was built for Wm. Panton cira 1855 at the time when a front porch on a house was becoming very popular. Architect Andrew Jackson Downing felt the porch has a link from the house to nature.

Thomas L. White was a leader in business practice. His 2nd store, which replaced the one destroyed by fire, was bigger and rivaled Toronto entrepreneur Timothy Eaton, with his merchandising efforts – with one exception. At times Mr. White used barter for payment. Mr. Eaton did not.

Mr. White's store had clearly defined departments: Millenary, Tailor shop, Boots and Shoes, Dry goods. Groceries and a Butcher shop. A customer could even present a list of desired items and a clerk would fill the order.

Zion Methodist Church built in 1860's, (now Kilbride United Church) originally stood on East Street – the cemetery is still there. The Church was part of a 6-church circuit. In 1878 a Mr. Curliss who had equipment for moving buildings, and the men of Kilbride led by Hall Gunby, a noted builder, moved the church on skids to its present location on the "main" street of Kilbride. James McNiven, George Harbottle and George Bennett supplied the oxen.

During a renovation in the early 1980's the original oil lamps were found hidden in the choir loft. The lamps have been restored and now hang back in the sanctuary.

By 1876 a 2-story stone schoolhouse with walls 2 feet thick was built. There was one teacher for each floor with about 70 students per teacher. By the turn of the century, with decreasing enrollment, one room was closed, only to be opened 50 years later. It was closed for good in 1961. George and Helen Whyte bought the school and converted it to their home. They maintained the original floors complete with the burn marks from the original wood stove and nail holes from the school desks. Upwards of 700 people attended the open house held before the couple moved in.

Dr. H. R. McDonald came to Kilbride in 1923. While in France, during WWI a Col. John McCrea handed Private McDonald a scrap of paper with a poem written in it. Dr. McDonald was one of the first people to see "In Flanders Fields".

Today Kilbride has something that none of the other villages in Burlington has – a Volunteer Firefighter Department – a department of about 65 volunteers. Training sessions are held regularly. Since there are no water mains in these rural areas, they have a pumper and a water tank truck. Firefighters must live or work within 6 minutes of the fire hall. They can also be called, as required, to aid at other fires.

The fire hall also houses the antique fire truck that is used at community events.

A life-long resident of Kilbride remembers when "during the summer holidays, when we were 'good as gold', Grandma treated us to a walk to Billy Mitchell's booth at the gas station where he served 'triple decker' ice cream cones to the village children for a nickel".
